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FOREWORD
by the
Deputy Minister

Since late 1999 Greece became officially a donor country by participating as a full member at the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) of the OECD, thus contributing to the global alliance against poverty. A share of GNP is yearly granted for supporting such programmes and raise deadlocks of local communities living in developing countries. Via its development co-operation Greece establishes bonds with civil societies of recipient countries, enhancing in parallel its political, intra state relations. Indeed, Greek efforts have been recognized from time to time by both International Organisations and recipient countries partners.

This ten year structure was influenced by the deep fiscal crisis that Greece is faced with. Total Official Development Assistance granted by Greece in 2009 was reduced to 0.19% of GNI from 0.21% in 2008 and in real terms to 436.08 MEURO from 504.94 MEURO.

Despite the difficult financial circumstances that correspondingly influence Development Assistance Directorates of all developed countries, Greece stands behind its international commitments its remote objective being to provide 0.7% of its GNI for development assistance until 2015. Furthermore, this current situation is considered to be an opportunity for a re-definition of Greek Development Policy in order to raise its effectiveness.

Greece is proceeding to a series of innovations in order for the money of the Greek taxpayer to achieve the best possible results. In this regard, Greece seeks to gradually reduce the number of aid recipient countries, as well as to focus its activities at the Millennium Development Goals that are connected with poverty, health and education.

Moreover, Greece has initiated the procedure for restructuring the *modus operandi* of HELLENIC AID of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, based on three principles: transparency, effectiveness and viability of activities. Effectiveness and viability of Greek development co-operation policy constitute the bases for Greece's appreciation, while transparency is a duty vis a vis the Greek people. It is for this reason that the Greek government seeks to mobilize all competent Bodies, either belonging to the State, the Local Government and naturally of civil society via Non Governmental Organisations and volunteers.

Development co-operation is a very important tool of our foreign policy to which we ascribe and will continue to ascribe great importance. Development Assistance still is mainly a bridge of co-operation of the developed with the developing world and consequently the Greek Development Policy invests in people, believing in a more just and viable future for humanity and the globe.

In 2009 the total Official Development Assistance that was granted to developing countries by DAC member states rose slightly by 0.7% in constant prices in relation to the previous year and reached 119.6 BUSD, while ODA/GNI ratio was 0.31%. It is important that ODA granted to Africa rose, in relation to 2008, by 3% in constant prices reaching 28 BUSD, whereas 25 BUSD were absorbed in Sub-Saharan Africa, thus raising ODA granted to this geographical region by 5.1% in relation to 2008.

Bilateral and multilateral ODA granted by Greece in 2009 reached 607.27 MUSD or 436.08 MEURO, that is 0.19% of Gross National Income. Multilateral ODA reached 310.33 MUSD or 222.85 MEURO, while bilateral ODA amounted to 296.94 MUSD or 213.23 MEURO. In relation to the previous year, total ODA of Greece was reduced by 95.89 MUSD or 68.86 MEURO, while ODA/GNI ratio was respectively reduced by 0.02% (from 0,21% in the year 2008 to 0,19% in 2009).

According to DAC/OECD estimations Greece will not reach the target set in the framework of the EU five years ago (ODA/GNI ratio = 0.56% collectively, ODA/GNI ratio = 0.51% at country level).

According to preliminary statistical data for the year 2009 Greece is ranked 20th among 23 DAC member states, in respect of both ODA volume granted and ODA/GNI ratio. In 2008 Greece was ranked 19th in both categories but among 22 member states.

The circumstances are difficult to achieve the international development assistance targets for the benefit of developing partners. Greece is facing a tremendous crisis and is combating its own war, while in the same time a global economic crisis is raging.

During the difficult days that will follow Greece will seek to strike a balance between reviving its economy and achieving its international commitments as regards its contribution to the process of achieving the millennium development goals.

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CHAPTER ONE

STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK OF CO-OPERATION WITH THE DEVELOPING WORLD



1-1 Basic Development Policy Framework and New Orientations

1.1.1. The new facts

In recent decades Greece was not merely interested for its own growth. On the contrary, when the necessary economic preconditions matured (1990s) Greece decided to participate at the global effort to promote economic prosperity of developing countries and countries with economies in transition. At a first stage Greece acted prudently and was engaged primarily via multilateral assistance programmes. Gradually, since 1997, having gained experience and significant available funds, it begun to implement far reaching bilateral assistance projects. This effort led in 1999 to the admission of Greece to the Development Assistance Committee (DAC) of the Organisation for economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

After becoming a member of the DAC, Greece committed itself to contribute to the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals that were adopted in 2000 (see: <http://milleniumgoals/>) and fulfill the quantitative and qualitative targets that have arisen from the Monterrey Consensus (2002), the Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness (2005), the European Consensus on Development (2005) - that sets the framework of EU development co-operation - and the Accra Agenda for Action (2008).

In this context the Greek targets were:

- provision of 0.33% of GNI for development assistance, in the form of ODA, to developing countries partners until the year 2007,
- provision of 0.51% of GNI until the year 2010, at a later stage deferred to 2012,
- the final objective being, provision of 0.70% of GNI until the year 2015.

Greece undertook its international commitments under the basic presupposition that fiscal circumstances would be favourable and would allow for the anticipated significant increase in ODA. In this regard Greece spared no effort to achieve the above mentioned targets. However, despite the relevant efforts, the expected increase of ODA to 0.33% of GNI in 2008 proved not to be feasible, due to fiscal restraints as well as very important unforeseen natural disasters that brought about a direct negative impact on the Greek budget. Consistent to the achievement of its international commitments, Greece deferred by two years the intermediate target for provision of 0.51% of GNI, i.e. by the year 2012.

In 2009 Greece was still a long way from achieving its commitments. Total ODA granted during this year reached the amount of 607.27 MUSD or 436.08 MEURO, that is just 0.19% of GNI. In fact, in relation to the year 2008, total ODA fell due to the difficult fiscal circumstances by 95.89 MUSD or 68.86 MEURO (approximately by 15.7%) while ODA/GNI ratio fell respectively by 0.02% (from 0.21% in 2008 to 0.19% in 2009). According to DAC/OECD estimations (April 2010) Greece will not reach in 2010 the target set in the framework of the EU in 2005 (a collective total of 0.56% of GNI in net ODA, with a minimum country target of 0.51%).

Today thirteen years after the official engagement of Greece in ODA provision, conditions have radically changed, since according to recent International Monetary Fund (IMF) reports the Greek economy suffers the most severe crisis of recent decades which will persist during the following years. Greece is thus facing unprecedented challenges. Indeed, in early 2010 Greece reached the verge of bankruptcy [year 2009: a) debt 115% of GNP tending to rise in the following years possibly to 148% in 2013, b) deficit more than 15% of GNP].

In this context the Greek government has introduced a three year reform programme supported by the European Commission, the European Central Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF), in order to combat the fundamental causes of its fiscal imbalances and structural weaknesses and ensure viability of public finances and improvement of its international competitiveness.

Furthermore, radical reforms have been introduced by the Greek government to restore fiscal balance and international competitiveness (reorganization of the tax and social security systems, radical reduction of public expenditure, reduction of salaries and pensions, privatizations, liberalization of markets – strengthening competition, combat bureaucracy and others).

Up to 2013 Greece will be under strict EU and IMF supervision via the eurozone member states and IMF's support mechanism. By now EU proposals as regards the future of financial administration include measures such as drawing up of member states' budgets under the supervision of the European commission, rigorous reviewing and supervision over implementation procedures and probably more rigid penalties for disobedient states.

Consequently, in recent years the Ministry of Finance radically reduces year after year available funds for ODA provision, the tendency being to be reduced even further due to the difficult fiscal circumstances.

1.1.2. Basic Development Policy Framework and New Orientations

Despite the above evolutions, Greece via the Hellenic International Development Co-operation Department - HELLENIC AID (see organigramme & personnel in ANNEXES [I] and [II]) will continue to work towards the achievement of the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) that compose the policy framework for achieving economic prosperity and welfare for all peoples of the world.

Furthermore, Greece remains strongly dedicated to the achievement of quality parameters of its development assistance for which it has committed itself during the years 2002-2008 in the framework of the "Monterrey Consensus on Financing for Development" (Mexico 2002), the "Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness" (Paris 2005), the "European Consensus on Development" (2005) and the "Accra Agenda for Action" (Accra 2008). Moreover, Greece's development policy will continue to directly link the basic target of poverty reduction with the fundamental principles of promoting good governance, respect of international law and human rights, as well as the active participation of civil society in the development process. Emphasis will also be given to health and education and to other horizontal issues such as gender equality and the environment.

Policy Coherence between Greek development co-operation policy and other sectoral policies is the most important prerequisite for achieving the above mentioned targets. By following EU prospects as regards Policy Coherence for Development in various sectors (trade, environment, climate change, security, agriculture, fisheries, social dimension of globalization and employment, immigration, research and innovation, information society, transport, energy), Greece seeks to improve official procedures, while it focuses its efforts to improve policy coherence for development at immigration policy, climate change, transport and trade.

Aid effectiveness is a precondition for the attainment of the MDGs. Therefore, from a very early stage (2004) Greece adopted an "Action Plan for Co-ordination and Harmonization" which entails specific commitments with regard to the five principles of the "Paris Declaration on Aid Effectiveness".

Furthermore, “alignment” of development co-operation with the systems of developing countries (policies, priorities, structures), “harmonization” of donors, “results centered” – “managing for development results” and aid “predictability”, are all considered as significant parameters for the achievement of the MDGs. In the framework of the effectiveness and harmonization of aid, Greece seeks co-operation with other donors, as this is determined by the DAC/OECD and the EU.

An illustrating example of advance in implementing the Paris Declaration commitments is the Hellenic Plan for the Economic Reconstruction of the Balkans (HiPERB) which has become instrumental by Law, thus reflecting a high political commitment. This is a single, comprehensive plan which implements an integrated development policy for the region. It is a multi-year programme which applies to Albania, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Bulgaria, FYROM, Romania, Serbia, and Montenegro. It covers three areas:

- Public Investments/Large scale projects officially proposed by governments of partner countries (79% of the budget),
- Private productive Investments (20%) and
- Small Projects (1%).

The success of the Plan is based on the fact that programmes are totally demand-driven, thus ensuring “ownership”, and follow the local and national systems of aid delivery, thus guaranteeing “alignment”.

On a smaller scale and with a different outlook, Greece is implementing a relief and rehabilitation programme in Sri Lanka which methodologically epitomises efforts to advance the “Paris Declaration” commitments.

It is also pointed out that planning as such, follows basic choices such as concentration of aid to a small number of countries and sectors in order to avoid dispersal of aid and thus manage better for development results.

In order to enhance harmonization through a more rational division of labour, Greece can report various examples, mainly through co-financing initiated at country level which has become a tool of choice. Indicatively, co-financing of numerous development projects by HELLENIC AID and many other bilateral donors (USA, Hungary, Lithuania, Estonia, the Czech Republic, Spain) in Afghanistan, as well as co-financing with International Organisations via Trust Funds as well as with UN Organisations with expected promising results.

In addition to the above, capacity building plays a decisive role for the attainment of the MDGs and this is reflected in Greece’s “Action Plan”. Development assistance in the form of technical co-operation that is granted by Greece includes establishment of organizational and institutional structures which strive to ensure that skills and technology (or know how) transferred to recipient countries will have a substantial impact and will allow partners to implement relevant programmes/projects without external assistance by the time Greek activities will have reached an end.

Greece is specializing in providing technical co-operation in the sector of “Social Infrastructure and Services”, namely in activities that enhance social development, such as promotion of medical care, enhancement of primary and secondary education for populations, provision of drinkable water and sanitation, vocational training for young people and women for job creation, establishment of institutions, strengthening of democratization and promotion of equal access for women in the development process.

As regards NGOs' request for further engagement at the ODA provision procedures, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs initiated closer co-operation with them. In May 2009 a working meeting took place for the first time ever between the Deputy Minister for Foreign Affairs and the General Director of HELLENIC AID with representatives of implementing agencies of development assistance projects. The subject of this meeting was to present the draft Annual Call for Proposals for submission of development assistance projects in the year 2009. Addressing NGO representatives the Deputy Minister stressed that the Ministry of Foreign Affairs opens a new ground for dialogue and co-operation with civil society, since for the first time it makes public the draft of the Call for Proposals in order for the involved agencies to submit their comments, remarks as well as their proposals.

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CHAPTER T W O

BASIC DEVELOPMENT CO-OPERATION PROGRAMME



2-1 Distribution of Aid

All development co-operation and assistance programmes are part of the Greek economic diplomacy and consequently an important tool of Greek foreign policy. In the framework of development co-operation strategic planning for the year 2009, a process that sought to enhance effectiveness of aid management, Greek development policy focused at a limited number of recipient countries and far-reaching priority sectors (countries–targets and sectors–targets), in order to achieve a higher degree of efficiency of its financing initiatives.

(see all ODA eligible countries in ANNEX [III] – source DAC/OECD).

Projects that are not included in the following sectors–targets and countries – targets, were not financed, with the exception of cases where international humanitarian and developmental needs were imminent or in cases that national interest imposed action. However, a number of projects were also eligible that sought to protect from or combat natural disasters. These were either independent projects or special activities of humanitarian aid projects, especially in African or Asian countries.

Moreover, eligible for financing was a number of projects implemented in Greece that aimed at:

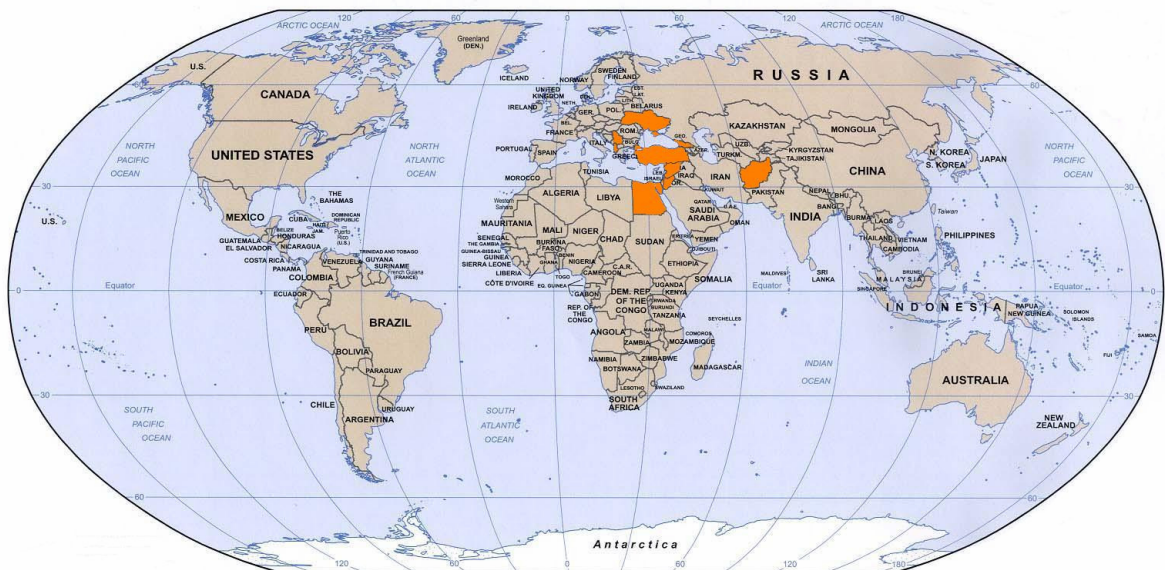
- Promoting development education and awareness raising of Greek public opinion and its familiarization with the notion of humanitarian/developmental aid that is granted by Greece and the EU,
- Enhancing volunteerism and preparing development co-operation executives, as well as
- Combating human trafficking.

In the year 2009 the call for tender issued by HELLENIC AID included activities in seven sectors, as follows:

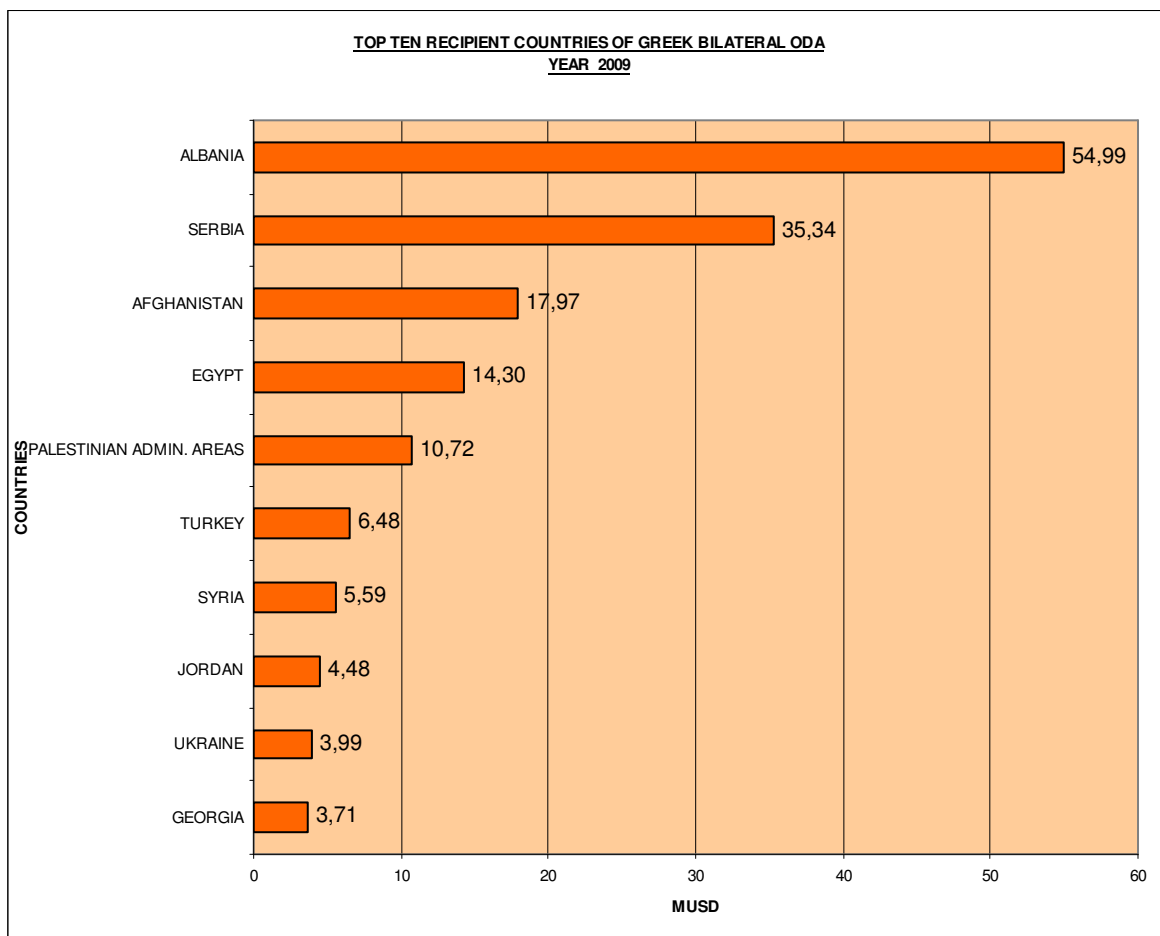
- Social and economic investments (e.g. construction of natural substructures such as ports and roads, transportation, schools, hospitals, telecommunications, new technologies etc.)
- Agricultural development, focusing at agricultural produce.
- Human security, focusing at activities for combating human trafficking.
- Environment, focusing at climate change, renewable sources of energy and energy saving methods.
- Promotion and development of local cultural heritage.
- Activation of immigrants, participation of immigrants staying in Greece in projects referring to their home countries, that is to develop immigrants into a form of bridges between the countries of origin and destination.
- Good governance.

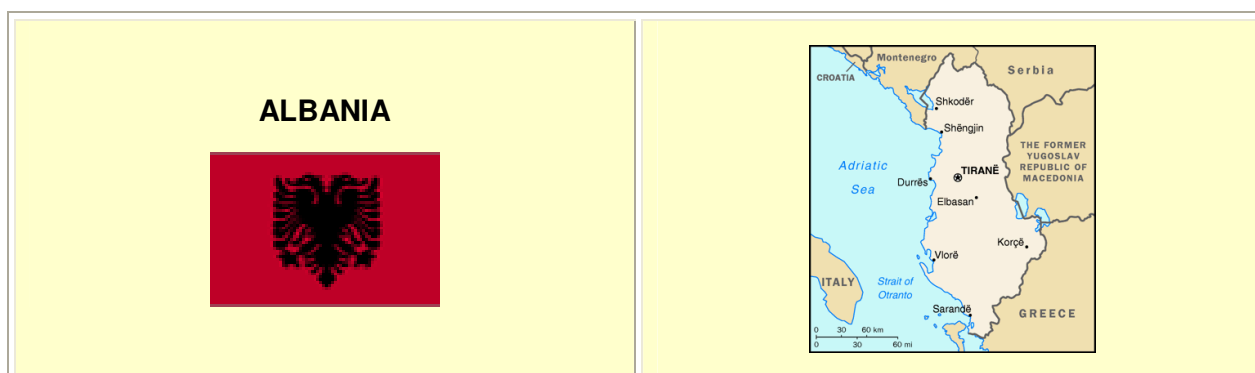
The notion of activity includes implementation of a uniform project in one or more countries or geographical regions. The activity is focused at target countries, yet it may include other eligible countries in wider regions of Greek interest, provided there is adequate reasoning of the relevant proposal.

In 2009 Greece provided bilateral official development assistance (ODA) in the form of grants amounting to 296.94 MUSD or 213.23 MEURO (see TABLES [3] & [4]).



The first ten recipient countries of Greek bilateral ODA in 2009 were: Albania, Serbia (Kosovo), Afghanistan, Egypt, the Palestinian Administered Areas, Turkey, Syria, Jordan, Ukraine, and Georgia.

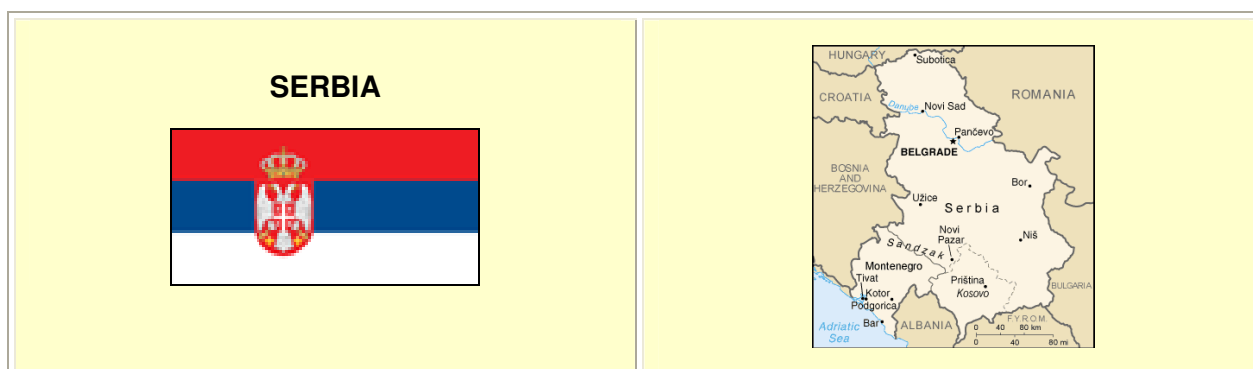

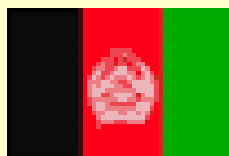

Greece provides its support to Afghanistan via initiatives that aim at: ending all disputes and hostilities, avoiding of negative consequences resulting from international or regional economic crises and natural disasters, democratization via institutional changes, combating illegal cultivation and trading of narcotics and enhancing gender equality.

In this framework and by following international initiatives that promote progress, reconstruction and stability in countries that need emergency aid, Greece considers Afghanistan as a priority country as regards its development co-operation policy, while it continues to promptly respond to the needs and problems of this country through:

- financial commitments
- participation at peacekeeping and security projects
- implementation of relief assistance projects for the population facing emergency situations.

In particular Greek development co-operation priorities in Afghanistan focus at the sectors of health, training on sanitation issues, women and children protection and culture. Furthermore, other multisector issues are considered such as gender equality, local government, institution building and good governance.

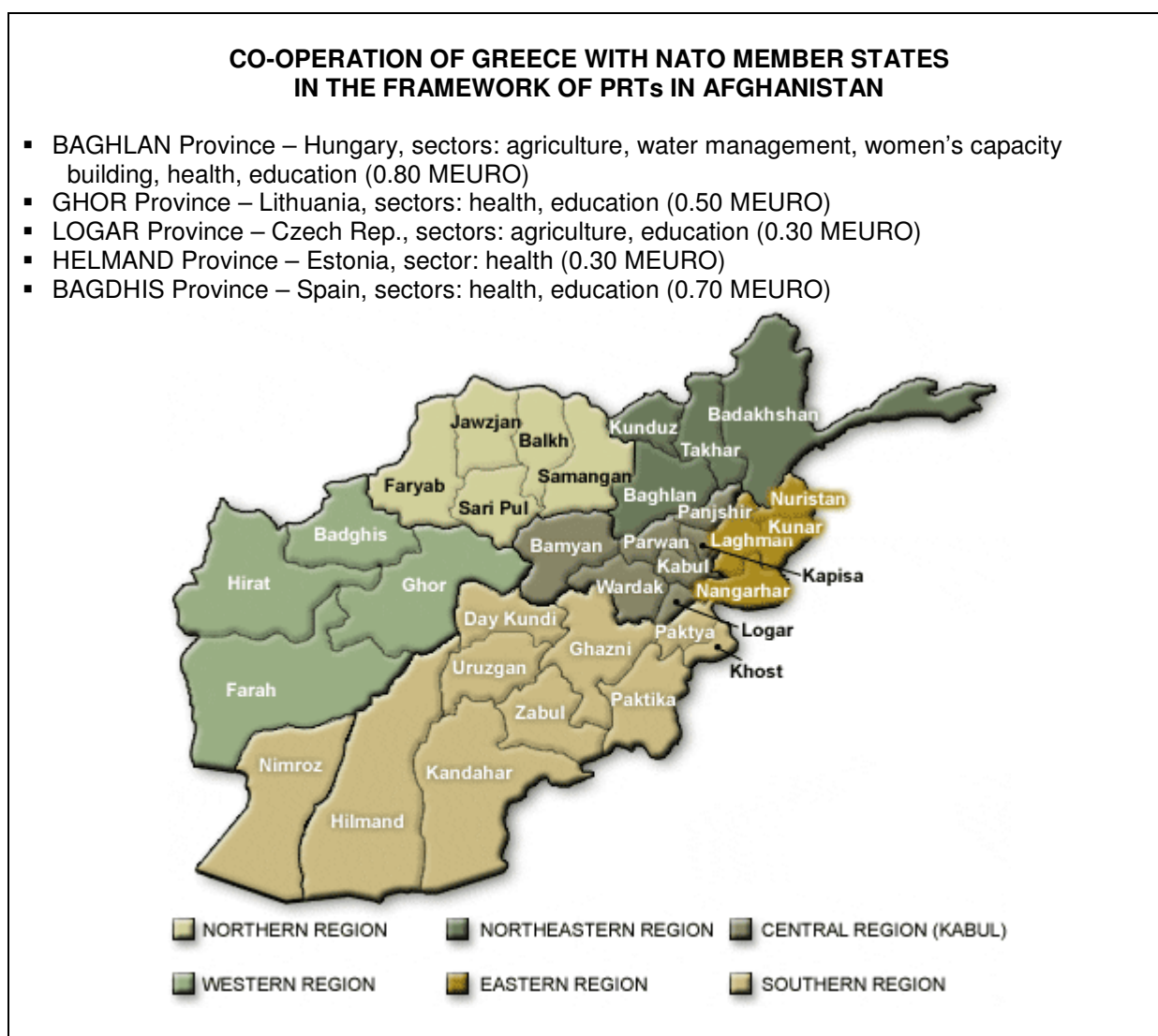
Beyond the activities that are financed through the annual call for proposals, Greece participates at activities of the international community to combat cultivation and dissemination of narcotics in Afghanistan, a problem that constitutes a drawback to the developmental effort of this country. During the informal Ministerial Conference of NATO (Bruxelles 26-1-2007) Greece announced a commitment to contribute the amount of 0.30 MUSD to the UN Counter Narcotics Trust Fund (CNTF). The amount was later disbursed.

The total development assistance granted by Greece to Afghanistan during the period 2002-2008 amounted to 67.08 MEURO. This amount includes financial commitments that Greece undertook during International Conferences for Afghanistan (Tokyo 2002, Berlin 2004, London 2006, Paris 2008) which in total reached 13.00 MEURO.

HELLENIC AID disbursed the following amounts during 2009:

- a) in the framework of co-operation with the Provincial Reconstruction Teams (PRTs) of Afghanistan:
- PRT under Hungarian command of Baghlan province – 0.30 MEURO, for the sectors of women capacity building, health and education, in addition to the amount of 0.50 MEURO that had been disbursed in 2008 for activities in the sectors of agriculture, education, water administration and health
 - PRT under Lithuanian command of Ghor province - 0.50 MEURO for the sectors of health (children vaccination) and education
 - PRT under Estonian command of Helmand province - 0.30 MEURO for the sector of health
 - PRT under Czech command of Lowgar province - 0.30 MEURO for the sector of agriculture and agricultural training
 - PRT under Spanish command of Badghis province - 0.70 MEURO for the sectors of health and education

- b) in the framework of co-operation with the World Food Programme (WFP), 0.40 MEURO

c) in the framework of co-operation with the Organisation for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE), for supporting the electoral procedures in August 2009, the amount of 0.10 MEURO.

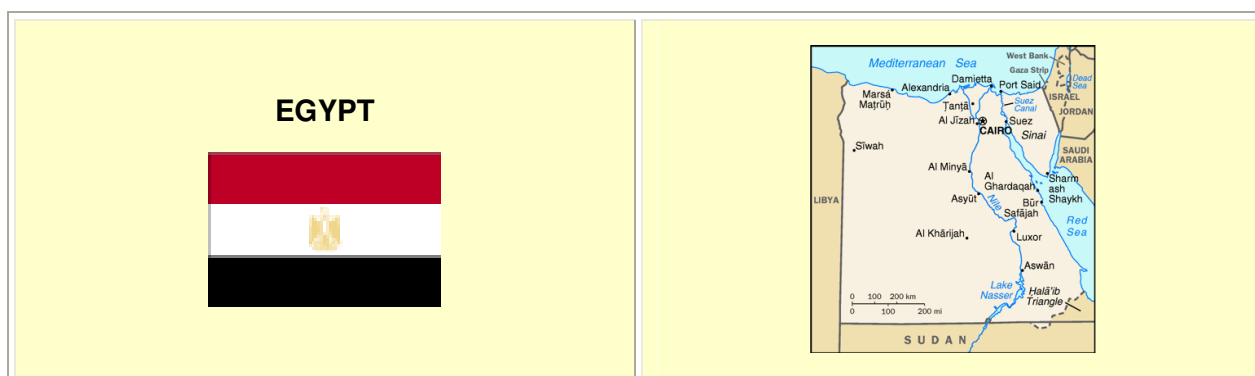
According to the above, total ODA granted by HELLENIC AID to Afghanistan in 2009 reached 4.60 MEURO.

Furthermore, in the framework of HELLENIC AID co-operation with the USA, the former will promptly disburse the amount of 2.00 MEURO as follows:

- secondary level women education, 1.00 MEURO.
- KfW/World Bank project for widening access to drinkable water in Kabul, 1.00 MEURO.
- Provision of a number of scholarships to Afghani students of the American College in Afghanistan to study in Greek Universities.

Co-operation has been anticipated with Germany for the project “Law and Order Trust Fund for Afghanistan” (LOFTA), under the auspices of the UNDP. The grant will reach 0.70 MEURO.

Description of an implemented project

In the aftermath of the hostilities outbreak, (December 2008) in the Gaza Strip, Greece swiftly responded to international community's appeals by providing emergency humanitarian aid to the affected population of the region.

Initially, two humanitarian missions were organised on the 1st of January 2009 and on the 8th of January 2009 respectively, transferring more than 41 tons of humanitarian assistance (mainly consisting of blood bottles, blood plasma, serums and medicines) by three C-130 aircrafts. The overall economic value of the above – mentioned aid amounted to 1,10 MEURO.

Another humanitarian mission succeeded on the 20th of January 2009 by cargo ship and carried medicines and food aid, that weighted more than 40 tons, in 2 containers.

The final mission was launched on the 1st of February 2009 and transferred a total of 145 tons of humanitarian aid, consisting of medicines and food, by cargo ship.

Additionally, Greece conveyed its eagerness to transfer 20 seriously wounded children from the Gaza Strip to Greek hospitals and to also cover the expenses for a respective number of individuals who would escort these Palestinian children.

In this humanitarian spirit, Greece decided to grant in February 2009 the amount of 0,40 MEURO for the Gaza Strip's devastated residents through an emergency food project run by the World Food Programme (WFP).

Finally, given the substantial damages that occurred in the Gaza Strip's social infrastructure (health and education) during the hostilities, Greece set the region as a priority geographical area of Greek development policy in 2009 (see the 2009 call for proposals for the submission of development co-operation projects on behalf of Ministries, NGOs and other agencies).

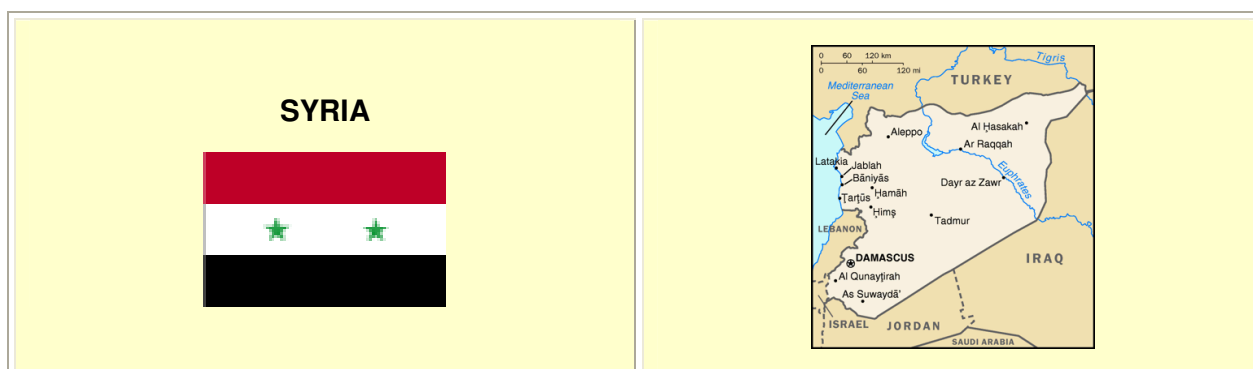

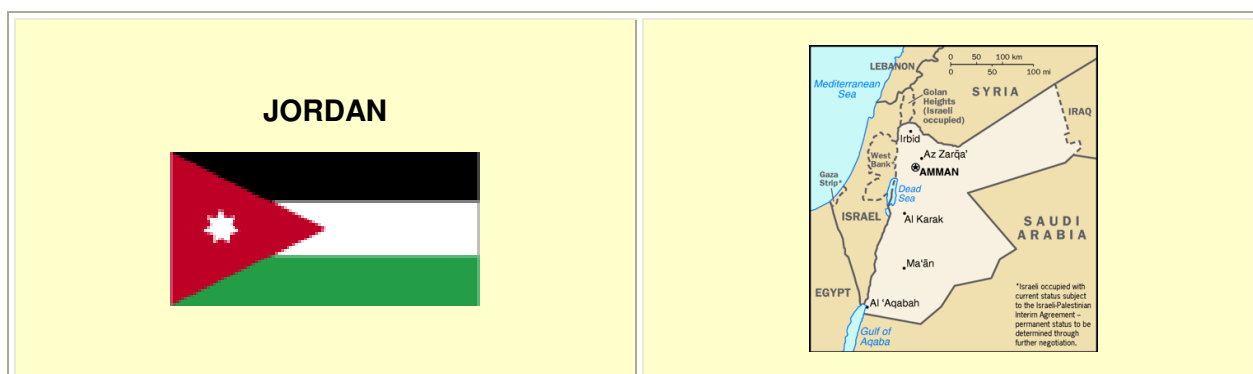

Description of an implemented project

Until the 2nd of November 2009, health services in Ukraine recorded 250,000 cases of patients, who probably fell ill with the new influenza A (H1 N1), while 70 cases of patients were reported as fatal according to the WHO. Indeed, the highest rates of the disease were reported in the western regions of Ukraine. Under the weight of the rapid increase in the number of influenza A (H1 N1) suspected cases, the Ukrainian president (Victor Yushchenko) appealed for international assistance in order to address the spread of the new influenza in his country.

In response to the Ukrainian request for emergency aid, Greece decided to promptly send antibiotic vaccines and medical material to the Ukraine.

In particular, on the 15th of December 2009 medicines and medical material collected by the Greek Ministry of Health and Social Solidarity, were transported by road from Athens to Kiev. Supplies consisted of:

- 150 boxes of Maxidex,
- 1,000 boxes of Tamiflu,
- 20,000 pairs of medical gloves and
- 6,000 pieces of surgical masks,

The total cost of this mission amounted to 0.03 MEURO whereas the above described humanitarian load was delivered to the Ukrainian Ministry of Health through the Greek Embassy in Kiev.

It is worth mentioning that Greece allocated the amount of 0.04 MEURO to Ukraine for the purchase of special protective uniforms for the Ukrainian staff working in emergency response units. This donation came as a response to the torrential floods that struck Ukraine in August 2008.

2-2 Emergency Humanitarian and Food Aid

2.2.1. Introduction

The ability of a nation to establish a coherent state based on the principles of democracy and good governance in order to respond to the needs of its population is minimized or overwhelmed by natural or humanly caused disasters. Armed conflicts, violation of human rights violent natural disasters, threaten human health, displace populations, split families and destabilize societies, undermine established living standards and in the end eradicate human lives. All countries in the world are potentially candidates to encounter emergency humanitarian situations. It is under these circumstances that humanitarian aid is called upon to respond to the initial urgent needs of the stricken populations and in addition to restore the capability of further development and stability.

2.2.2. Institutional issues

During 2009 the international community repeatedly responded to appeals for emergency humanitarian aid by developing countries, which were caught in severe humanitarian crises, caused by natural disasters or armed conflicts.

Under the International Organisations' co-ordination and guidelines, in particular under those of the United Nations and the European Union, and via co-ordination of its Public Agencies, Greece was yet again among the European countries that sent emergency humanitarian aid for reliving stricken populations.

Following consecutive meetings that took place in 2009 with the competent Agencies such as the Greek Ministry of National Defence (YPEUA), the Greek Ministry of the Interior – General Secretariat of Civil Protection (YPES/GGPP), the Greek Ministry of Health & Social Solidarity (YPYGKA) and the Greek Red Cross, the final version of the Standing Order 5-4/2009 was issued on the “Procedures of Humanitarian Aid Provision Abroad”, which describes the competences of each Agency and the procedure of aid provision to developing countries that face humanitarian crises.

Within this framework Greek Authorities follow closely and continuously the operations of the two international Co-ordinating Centres, one under the auspices of NATO (Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Center – EADRCC) and the second in the framework of the EU (Monitoring Information Center – MIC). These centres disseminate information on the situation in stricken areas, send experts in the field to undertake disaster evaluation, collect information from their local Offices – if there are any at the vicinity – and record the needs of the affected population. They also record humanitarian aid offered by various donor countries and co-ordinate efforts for the transportation of aid.

On the basis of the above mentioned true time electronically disseminated information and further assessments of the Greek Authorities located at the stricken areas that also follow progress of events and participate at on the spot Co-ordinating Bodies and Committees, the Greek internal mechanism for the provision of humanitarian aid to third countries is set in motion, according to Standing Order No. 5-4/2009 on “Procedures of Humanitarian Aid Provision Abroad”. Furthermore, at an internal level, the information provision and co-operation with humanitarian NGOs and Authorities mechanism is set in motion on a 24 hour basis. All are informed in respect of appeals and responses to the crises, in order to achieve the best possible co-ordination of aid.

According to the above, following a Ministerial Decree of the Minister of Foreign Affairs, in co-operation with the competent Ministries for the occasion YPES/GGPP, YPEUA and YPYGKA, Greece sends humanitarian aid in kind considering the nature of appeals and always in the framework of the “Good Humanitarian Donorship Principles”.

Moreover, in 2009 Law 3741/6-2-2009 was issued that refers to the ratification of the framework agreement between Greece and the Food and Agricultural Organisation (FAO). This framework agreement anticipates close co-operation between FAO and Greece at the sector of food security via the implementation of relevant projects by FAO in the following countries: Egypt, Ethiopia, Albania, Armenia, Georgia, Congo Dem. Rep., Moldova and the Ukraine. Lastly, it leaves open the possibility of extending this co-operation to other geographical regions that may be proposed by Greece to FAO, since it is Greece that takes up the responsibility of supporting implemented projects, either financially or in kind.

2.2.3. An outline of Greek humanitarian aid in 2009

Greek humanitarian aid is divided into four categories of financial flows, namely (i) the emergency humanitarian aid which takes the form of humanitarian and food missions to countries and regions in need, (ii) and (iii) the multilateral and multi-bilateral aid which is channeled to developing countries through International Organisations and (iv) bilateral aid which reaches directly developing countries.

The difference between multilateral and multi – bilateral aid lays in the fact that the latter is allocated to specialised international agencies for assisting specific developing countries or sectors, defined in advance by the donor country and taking into account international appeals. On the contrary, in the case of multilateral aid, the international agency is fully entitled by the donor country to decide on the purpose of financial contribution as well as on the means of channeling aid.

2.2.3.1. An outline of the main Greek humanitarian and food aid missions in 2009

▪ Humanitarian crisis in the Gaza Strip

(see activities above – Chapter 2.1)

▪ Humanitarian crisis in Zimbabwe

Over the period 2008–2009, Zimbabwe was found in a precarious position due to the cholera epidemic that struck its population. It is indicative that the World Health Organisation (WHO) reported that 79,613 individuals fell ill, probably with cholera and estimated that 3,731 out of them died of cholera complications within the period from August 2008 to February 2009. This latest cholera epidemic (two severe cholera outbreaks preceded in 1999 and 2002) came to deteriorate the food crisis that has hit Zimbabwe since 2002.

Given the urgent need for combating the cholera epidemic in Zimbabwe, Greece sent humanitarian aid in kind by cargo ship, which departed from Piraeus on the 6th of February 2009. In particular, the Ministry of National Defence in co-operation with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs forwarded 45 tons of food aid (rice, wheat, food) as well as water purification tablets in two containers. The total cost of this humanitarian mission, including transport costs, amounted to 0.10 MEURO. A second humanitarian mission followed by cargo ship and transferred 24 tons of food aid (consisting of rice, olive oil, sugar, tea and high energy biscuits) and water purification tablets in two containers. The cost of the second mission amounted to 0.10 MEURO.

Greece’s contribution was not only expressed in the form of humanitarian aid in kind. It also included the donation of 0.25 MEURO for funding the WHO’s health and safe drinking water

projects in Zimbabwe. Furthermore, the amount of 0.65 MEURO was donated to the WFP for assisting the most vulnerable population groups that had been directly affected by the cholera epidemic and the long lasting food crisis.

Overall, Greece allocated the amount of 1.11 MEURO to Zimbabwe in 2009.

▪ Humanitarian crisis in Ukraine

(see activities above – Chapter 2.1)

▪ Humanitarian mission for Somali refugees living in Djibouti

On the 5th of March 2009 the Hellenic Air Force, in response to a request submitted by the Patriarchate of Alexandria to the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs, sent to Djibouti a C-130 aircraft that transferred medicines (antibiotics, pain relief pills, anti-inflammatory, anti-tuberculosis and immune adjuvants) as well as medical equipment (stethoscopes, blood pressure monitors, a portable cardiograph and an ophthalmoscope) having a total cost of 0.02 MEURO. This humanitarian aid targeted Somali refugees who have swarmed to Djibouti due to the long lasting civil war that has plagued Somalia since 1991. Moreover, in the context of this long term humanitarian crisis that affects Djibouti, Greece granted the amount of 0,10 MEURO for financially reinforcing the WFP's food interventions in this country.

2.2.3.2. Multilateral and multi-bilateral humanitarian aid

During 2009 Greece channelled multilateral and multi – bilateral humanitarian aid to developing countries through the following International Organisations and United Nations' specialised Agencies and Funds:

- United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR),
- Organisation Internationale de la Francophonie (OIF),
- World Food Programme (WFP),
- Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF),
- United Nations Children Fund (UNICEF),
- Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA),
- International Organisation of Migration (IOM),
- World Health Organisation (WHO),
- United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC),
- World Meteorological Organisation (WMO),
- Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD),
- International Campaign to Ban Landmines (ICBL),
- United Nations Trust Fund for Human Security (UNTFHS) and
- International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD).

As regards the distribution of Greek multilateral and multi – bilateral humanitarian aid to developing countries, the following amounts are indicative of Greece's commitment to international cooperation:

- 3.00 MEURO were granted to the WFP (recipients: Afghanistan, Pakistan, Kyrgyz Republic, Armenia, Georgia, Ethiopia, Somalia, Djibouti, Senegal, Kenya, Congo Dem. Rep., Zimbabwe and Sudan),
- 0.78 MEURO were granted to UNCHR for funding activities for the protection of refugees,
- 0.44 MEURO were granted to the OIF for assisting activities on good governance and gender equality taking place in Greece's priority countries in Africa,
- 0.40 MEURO were granted to the WFP as relief aid to the population affected by recent hostilities in the Gaza Strip,
- 0.35 MEURO were granted to CERF,

- 0.20 MEURO were granted to UNICEF for aid provision to countries at the Horn of Africa,
- 0.18 MEURO were granted to the Greek branch of IOM for funding activities against human trafficking,
- 0.10 MEURO were granted to UNODC for further assisting improvements in Egypt's institutional framework on combating human trafficking and
- 0.10 MEURO were granted to OCHA for providing emergency aid to Yemen.

2.2.3.3. Bilateral humanitarian aid

Greek bilateral humanitarian aid in 2009 included interventions in the following countries:

- 0.04 MEURO were provided to the Palestinian Administered Areas for assisting humanitarian interventions in the Gaza Strip,
- 0.14 MEURO were donated to Vietnam for assisting a livestock improvement project, for purchasing and distributing wheelchairs to disabled persons and for supporting dioxin victims,
- 0.03 MEURO were granted to Kenya for the financial assistance of the local Bama community,
- 0.10 MEURO were granted to Pakistan as financial assistance for the displaced populations of the Swat valley,
- 0.002 MEURO were granted to Peru for purchasing blankets and food for residents of Southern mountainous areas that were affected by freezing temperatures,
- 0.01 MEURO were granted to Malawi for funding humanitarian interventions through a charity, namely "Sunrise Elderly and Orphan Care Trust" and
- 0,10 MEURO were granted to Philippines for humanitarian activities.

It must be noted that the above mentioned activities were selected in order to be funded on the basis of the following criteria:

- In accordance with the principles of humanity, impartiality, neutrality and independence, as defined by the "Principles and Good Practice of Humanitarian Donorship".
- Following international appeals (flash appeals) for combating humanitarian crises or natural disasters.
- In accordance with the annual call for proposals, for the submission of development co-operation projects on behalf of Ministries, NGOs and other agencies that sets specific priority geographical areas and sectors of the Greek development policy.

2.2.4. Human rights

A major area of activity of Greek humanitarian aid is human rights protection and especially human security protection, as is formally expressed in the annual call for proposals for the submission of development co-operation projects on behalf of Ministries, NGOs and other Agencies. It is significant that "human security with an emphasis upon activities to combat human trafficking" is included in the seven (7) priority sectors, which were set by the annual call for proposals.

In particular, Greek contributions to International Organisations for funding activities aiming at combating human trafficking amounted to 0.51 EURO in 2009, whereas the respective amount to Greek NGOs amounted to 0.45 EURO. Greek contributions to International Organisations financed the following activities:

- 0.10 MEURO were donated to UNODC for assisting further improvement of Egypt's institutional and penal framework of local partners and the Ministries of the Interior and Justice on combating human trafficking.
- 0.11 MEURO were offered to UNICEF Greece for funding public awareness campaigns on combating human trafficking. Specifically, UNICEF's National Committee in Greece in co-operation with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs launched a campaign

entitled “International crisis, children trade and trafficking in the world” that was presented to the public in the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs’ “Yannos Kranidiotis” conference hall on the 16th of July 2009.

- 0.12 MEURO were granted to the Greek branch of IOM for the conduct of a training seminar in Chalkidiki (10-12/4/2009) as well as conference in Kallithea Kassandra of Chalkidiki (10/12/2009) in collaboration with the Greek Association of Judges and Prosecutors. Some three hundred judges and prosecutors took part at this seminar and received information by experts on combating of human trafficking issues (human trafficking in human beings). Similarly, judges and experts in the field of combating human trafficking participated at a conference entitled “Illegal human trafficking, trade in human beings and electronic crime”.
- 0.18 MEURO were offered to the Greek branch of IOM for enhancing its efforts of combating human trafficking during 2009.

Contributions to NGOs for funding activities related to combating human trafficking, were disbursed as follows:

- 0.14 MEURO were approved for funding the project “NATHALIE III – Protection of children of Albanian origin which are subject to neglect or exploitation” implemented by NGO “ARSIS – Social Organisation for Youth Support”. This project constitutes a follow – up activity to earlier cross – border activities undertaken for the protection of women and children, facing the risk of exploitation. In particular, this project anticipates for the operation of a shelter in Thessaloniki, a day centre in Tirana that will offer psychological counseling to children, as well as the launch of a public awareness campaign on human trafficking.



The entrance of the Day Center in Tirana of NGO “ARSIS – Organisation for Supporting the Youth” – project for combating trafficking and protecting children in Albania “NATHALIE III” co-financed by HELLENIC AID

- 0.09 MEURO were approved for funding the project, “ARIADNI Network – Development of a website and exchange of good practices and public awareness on

combating human trafficking in South - Eastern Europe” implemented by NGO “Human Rights Defence Centre” (KEPAD). This project aims at further developing the already functional website of “ARIADNI Network”, the issuing of a good practices manual on combating human trafficking and conducting of a series of awareness raising campaigns on informing vulnerable population groups about human trafficking.

- 0.15 MEURO were approved for funding the project “Legal, psychological and social counseling to foreign victims of trafficking, stateless foreigners arriving in Greece and foreigners suffering from HIV/AIDS“, implemented by NGO “Greek Council for Refugees”. The project anticipates for the provision of legal counseling and assistance before the competent administrative authorities or courts, as well as psychological and social counseling to stateless foreigners or trafficking victims.

At this point, it must be mentioned that apart from funding activities for combating human trafficking, the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs showed interest for a series of issues that are closely linked with human trafficking by participating, along with national or international agencies, in relevant meetings.

In Chania of Crete (17-18/09/2009) the third international meeting of experts in the context of “ILAEIRA” Plan (Inter – service action plan on combating women and children trafficking – an initiative undertaken by the former Ministry of Public Order and the Hellenic Police). In particular, representatives from

- all competent ministries
 - Justice
 - Foreign Affairs
 - Health and Social Solidarity
 - Finance
 - Education
 - Employment and Social Protection
 - Mercantile Marine
 - Aegean and Island Policy
- Embassies of the United Kingdom and the United States of America
- prosecuting authorities
- police services and
- Greek local Authorities

took part in this meeting.

Moreover, experts were present at this international meeting from:

- twenty (20) European countries (Portugal, Turkey, Italy, Albania, Cyprus, Bosnia – Herzegovina, Hungary, Moldova, FYROM, Austria, Serbia, Slovenia, Russia, Ukraine, France, Croatia, Montenegro, Finland, Bulgaria and Romania) and
- five (5) international agencies (Europol, Interpol, Eurojust, Frontex and Seci)

Lastly, on the 2nd of December 2009 a workshop entitled “Preventing and combating trafficking of Nigerian girls and women in Greece” was hosted by the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs and organised by the United Nations Interregional Crime and Justice Research Institute (UNICRI).

2-3 Public Opinion, Information and Development Education

Within the framework of the Greek International Development Co-operation policy, YDAS-4 Directorate of HELLENIC AID undertook, *inter alia*, the following activities in 2009, regarding the mobilization of civil society, awareness raising and promotion of volunteerism:

2.3.1. Organization of and participation in national and international events

European Development Days 2009 (Stockholm, 22-24 October 2009)

Hellenic Aid co-ordinated the Greek participation in the «European Development Days 2009», organised by the European Commission in Stockholm.

The general topic was “Citizens and Development” with emphasis on democratic society and climate change.



The Greek stand presented the main geographical and sectoral priorities of the Greek international development assistance policy, with emphasis on selected activities initiated by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, related to:

- the environment,
- climate change and
- renewable energy sources.

A special video highlighted the most important humanitarian and developmental activities of Greece in the world.

Visitors were handed out informative booklets on Greek development assistance policy as regards environmental sustainability and a DVD presenting the documentary “Qadir: An

Afghan Ulysses”. The later was a development education project, co-financed by HELLENIC AID, seeking to raise awareness on immigration issues.



Hellenic Aid stand, 74th Thessaloniki International Exhibition, September 2009

During the Thessaloniki International Exhibition, HELLENIC AID organized a special promotion stand in the aforesaid exhibition area.

Special Album edition: “Greece: Power of Humanity and Solidarity in the Developing World”, September 2009

HELLENIC AID undertook the publication of a bilingual special album edition entitled “Greece: Power of Humanity and Solidarity in the Developing World”. The Album includes a presentation of the basic parameters of the Greek policy for development co-operation and assistance. It illustrates briefly the major development and humanitarian programmes and development education activities, as well as the initiatives on environment and climate change.



The album presents also relevant photographic material and was widely distributed during the 74th Thessaloniki International Exhibition.

2.3.2. Other activities aiming at development education, awareness raising and volunteerism promotion

Development Education Material “Against the Stream”, November 2009

The production of Development Education Material “Against the Stream” was part of a development education project, entitled “Against the stream. Access in food. Nonnegotiable human right/Planet in crisis - Students of World in action! ”, co-financed by HELLENIC AID and implemented by NGO “Action Aid”.

It is an innovative educational material that includes a book of activities, an educational film in DVD form and an interactive map - poster for the primary education pupils. The educational material seeks to raise awareness among students and high school teaching staff on the issues of climate change and the consequences upon people’s lives in developing countries, in relation to access to food and water.

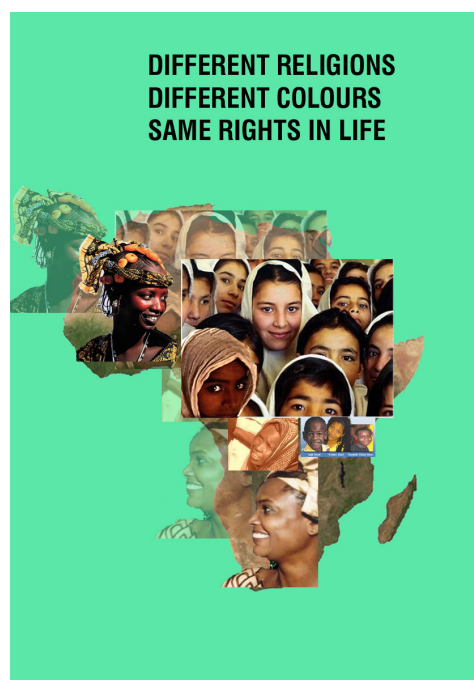
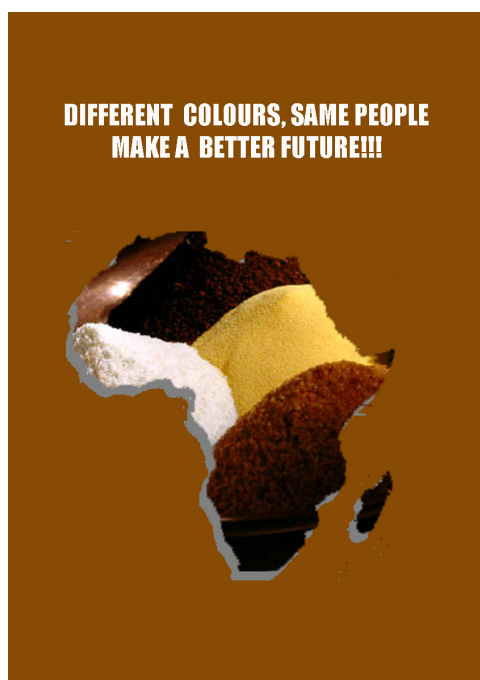

Development Youth Prize 2009, October 2009

HELLENIC AID undertook to plan promotional activities for the Competition entitled "Development Youth Prize 2008-2009" targeting the Greek student and educational communities. This is an art competition (multimedia presentation, poster or photograph) among students from EU Member States' schools with emphasis on sustainable development in Africa and specifically on the issues of climate change, water and energy and sustainable tourism.



The competition was organised for third consecutive year from the European Commission, in co-operation with the European Schoolnet (EUN), aiming at promoting the idea of international development co-operation to young people. The selection of national winners took place in September 2009, while the awarding ceremony took place in Stockholm, in October 2009, in the framework of the European Development Days.



Memorandum of Understanding between the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Local Union of Municipalities and Communities of Attica (T.E.D.K.N.A.) February 2009

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs has consciously enhanced its co-operation relations with Local Authorities, aiming at improving long term effective management and responsiveness to international humanitarian crises. Considering the ever rising interest of individuals as well as that of many Greek Municipalities to collect donations in kind, at various points in time, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Local Union of Municipalities and Communities of Attica (T.E.D.K.N.A.) signed (February 2009) a relevant Memorandum of Understanding.



By this Memorandum the two signatories pledge to take co-ordinated action towards humanitarian crises. Moreover, in this framework, HELLENIC AID has already planned and implemented in Municipalities and Communities of Attica, a public information campaign that aims at raising public awareness - especially of the younger population - and also at promoting the idea of volunteerism in relation with humanitarian assistance. T.E.D.K.N.A. is willing to transfer the necessary information and know-how of HELLENIC AID to the competent Agencies of Local Authorities and Bodies and their citizens, by organising teams of volunteers.

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CHAPTER THREE

DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE STATISTICS



3-1 Official Development Assistance – International Flows

Total ODA granted to developing countries in 2009 by member states of the DAC rose slightly by 0.7% (constant prices) in relation to the previous year and reached 119.6 BUSD, while ODA/GNI ratio (Gross National Income) for all member states was 0.31%. It is important to note that ODA granted to Africa rose, in relation to 2008, by 3% (constant prices) reaching 28 BUSD, whereas 25 BUSD were absorbed in Sub-Saharan Africa, thus raising ODA granted to this geographical region by 5.1% in relation to the previous year.

The largest, by volume, ODA donors in 2009 were the United States, France, Germany, the United Kingdom and Japan, while five countries exceeded the UN target of 0.7% of GNI (Denmark, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Norway and Sweden).

The combined ODA of the DAC members that are also EU members (15 members), decreased slightly, in relation to the previous year, by 0.2% in real terms to 67.1 BUSD (56% of all DAC members' ODA). As a share of GNI, ODA from DAC-EU members rose to 0.44%. Aid rose in : Belgium, France, Denmark, United Kingdom, Luxemburg, Sweden and Finland, while aid fell in: Austria, Germany, Ireland, Italy, the Netherlands, Portugal, Spain and Greece (-12% that reflects ODA cuts due to fiscal difficulties). Net ODA granted by the European Commission rose by 4.4% in real terms to 15.0 BUSD.

Aid granted in 2009 by other DAC/OECD donors, not EU members, rose as follows: USA (5.4%), Republic of Korea (13.5%), Norway (17.3%) and Switzerland (11.5%), while it fell in Japan (-10,7%), Australia (-1,4%), Canada (-9,5%) and New Zealand (-3,2).

ODA granted by other non member states of the DAC/OECD in 2009 rose as follows: Hungary (21.7%), Poland (13.2%), Turkey (2.1%), while it fell in the Czech Republic (-4,7%), Iceland (-11,7%) and Slovakia (-18,9%).

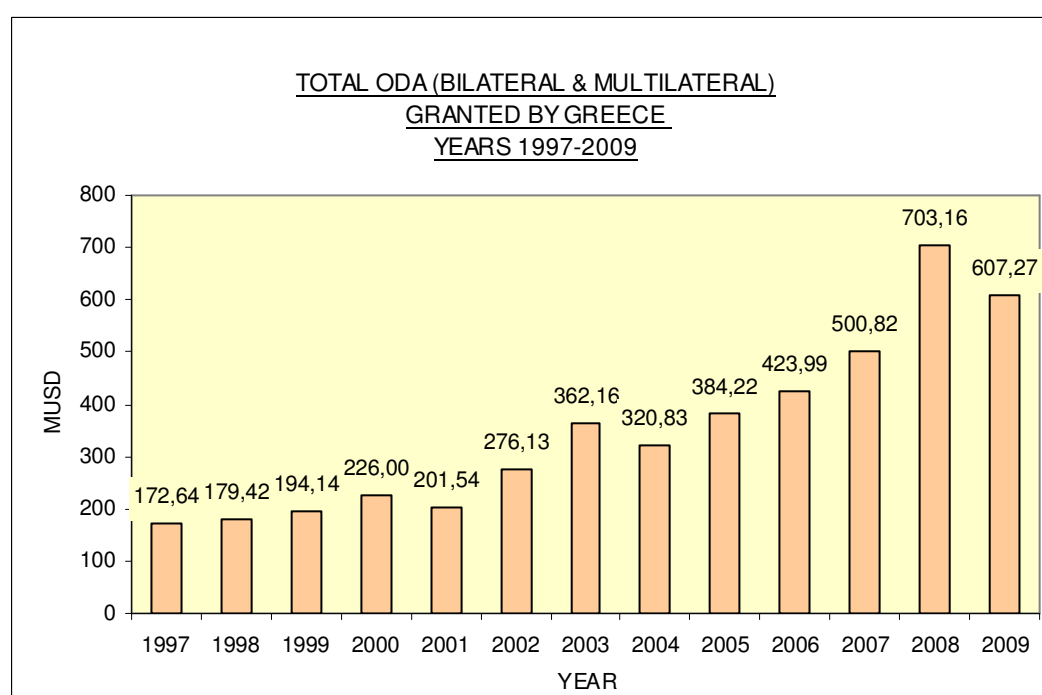
DAC member states proceeded in previous years to various statements – commitments, to increase their development aid from 80 BUSD in 2004 to 130 BUSD in 2010 (at constant 2004 prices). Since then, according to OECD estimations, donors' commitments for 2010 have been reduced to 126 BUSD due to the economic crisis and GNI reductions. While most DAC/OECD member states have maintained their commitments for 2010, others, including some large donors, have reduced or postponed the pledges they made for this year. According to OECD estimations:

- the overall expected ODA level for 2010 is estimated at 108 BUSD (at constant 2004 prices), with the ODA/GNI ratio rising over the same period to 0.32%. The shortfall is 18 BUSD and will mostly affect Africa
- expressed in 2009 prices, projected 2010 ODA is estimated at 126 BUSD, representing an increase of 6 BUSD over 2009.

3-2 Official Development Assistance of Greece

The following is reported as regards Greece (see GRAPH [B1]):

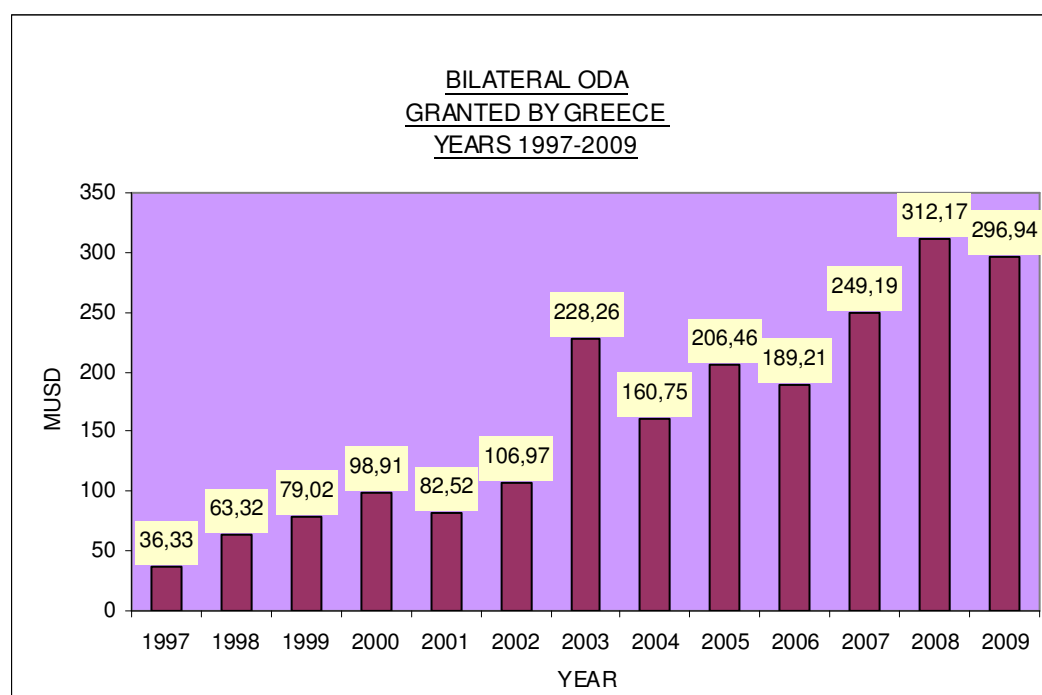
- Total (bilateral and multilateral) ODA granted by Greece in 2009 reached 607.27 MUSD or 436.08 MEURO, that is 0.19% of GNI (GNI 2009 = 321,595.88 MUSD or 230,938.00 MEURO according to data from the Ministry of Finance from 1-6-2010). Multilateral ODA reached 310.33 MUSD or 222.85 MEURO, while bilateral ODA amounted to 296.94 MUSD or 213.23 MEURO. In relation to 2008, total Official Development Assistance of Greece was reduced by 95.89 MUSD or 68.86 MEURO (approximately 15.7%), while ODA/GNI ratio dropped respectively by 0.02% (from 0.21% in 2008 to 0.19% in 2009).



- Specifically, the above mentioned reduced ODA disbursements were due to diminished flows granted to International Organisations, as well as reductions in Technical Co-operation and Emergency Assistance funds.
- According to DAC/OECD estimations some DAC-EU donors will surpass in 2010 the goal they set in 2005 (i.e. to reach a collective total of 0.56% of GNI in net ODA for that year, with a minimum country target of 0.51%), Sweden (1.01%), Luxembourg (1.00%), Denmark (0.83%), the Netherlands (0.8%), Belgium (0.7%), the United Kingdom (now estimated at 0.6%), Finland (0.56%), Ireland (0.52%) and Spain (0.51%), while others will not reach the target: France (0.46%), Germany (0.40%), Austria (0.37%), Portugal (0.34%), Greece (0.21%), and Italy (0.20%).
- According to OECD statistical data for the year 2009 (see ANNEX [IV]), Greece is ranked 20th among 23 DAC member states (on 1-1-2010 the Rep. of Korea became a member of the DAC) in respect of both ODA volume granted (607.27 MUSD) and ODA/GNI ratio (0.19%). In 2008 Greece was ranked 19th in both categories, but among 22 member states.

3-3 Bilateral Official Development Assistance of Greece

Total bilateral ODA granted in 2009 by Ministries, Legal Bodies, Universities, NGOs etc. reached 296.94 MUSD or 213.23 MEURO, that is 0.09% of GNI reduced by 15.23 MUSD in relation to the previous year 2008 (312.17 MUSD or 0.09% of GNI).



It is important to note the significant in recent years increase of aid granted by Greece to special categories of countries.

- to Least Developed countries (LDCs)
year 2008 = 25.96 MUSD,
year 2009 = 28.97 MUSD, a rise of 11.5%
- to African countries
year 2008 = 44.28 MUSD,
year 2009 = 46.40 MUSD, a rise of 4.7%
- to Afghanistan
year 2008 = 10.13 MUSD,
year 2009 = 17.97 MUSD, a rise of 77%
- to Sub-Saharan Africa (stable flows)
year 2008 = 24.85 MUSD,
year 2009 = 23.87 MUSD

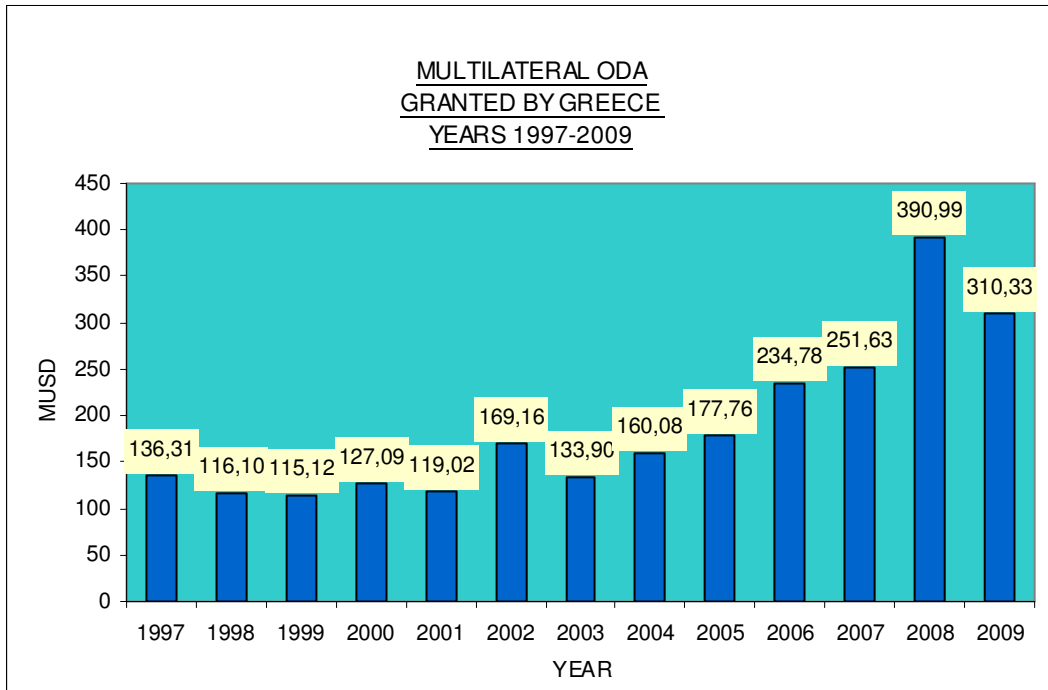

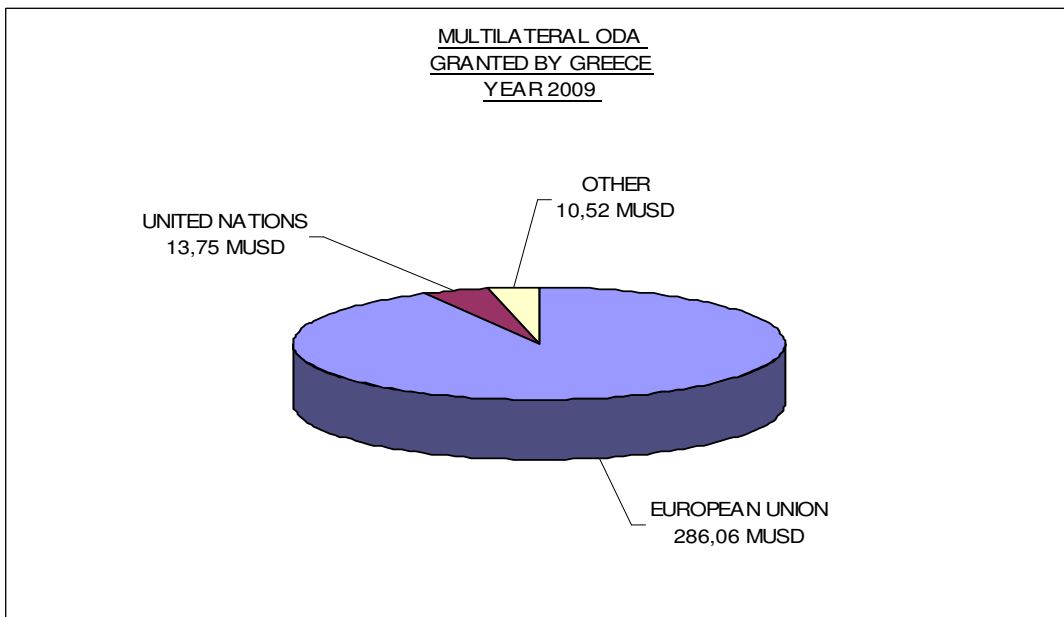

Multilateral Official Development Assistance of Greece

Total multilateral ODA subscriptions of Greece to International Organisations in the year 2009 amounted to 310.33 MUSGD or 222.85 MEURO (0.10% of GNI, 51% of total bilateral and multilateral ODA), reduced by 80.66 MUSGD in relation to the previous year 2008 (390.99 MUSGD)



Greek multilateral aid is granted primarily through three sources, namely, the European Union, the United Nations and International Financing Organizations including the World Bank, among which is the World Bank. Specifically, subscriptions were paid to the following International Organisations:



3-5 Special Account of Article 18 paragraph 6 of Law 2731/1999

At the beginning of fiscal year 2009 (1-1-2009) the starting balance of the Special Account was 4,286,599.74 EURO. During 2009, the account's two new inflows amounted to 1,150 EURO in total, while there were no disbursements. Consequently, the available balance on 31-12-2009 was 4,287,749.74.

Bilateral Official Development Assistance Granted by Geographical Region [Year 2009]

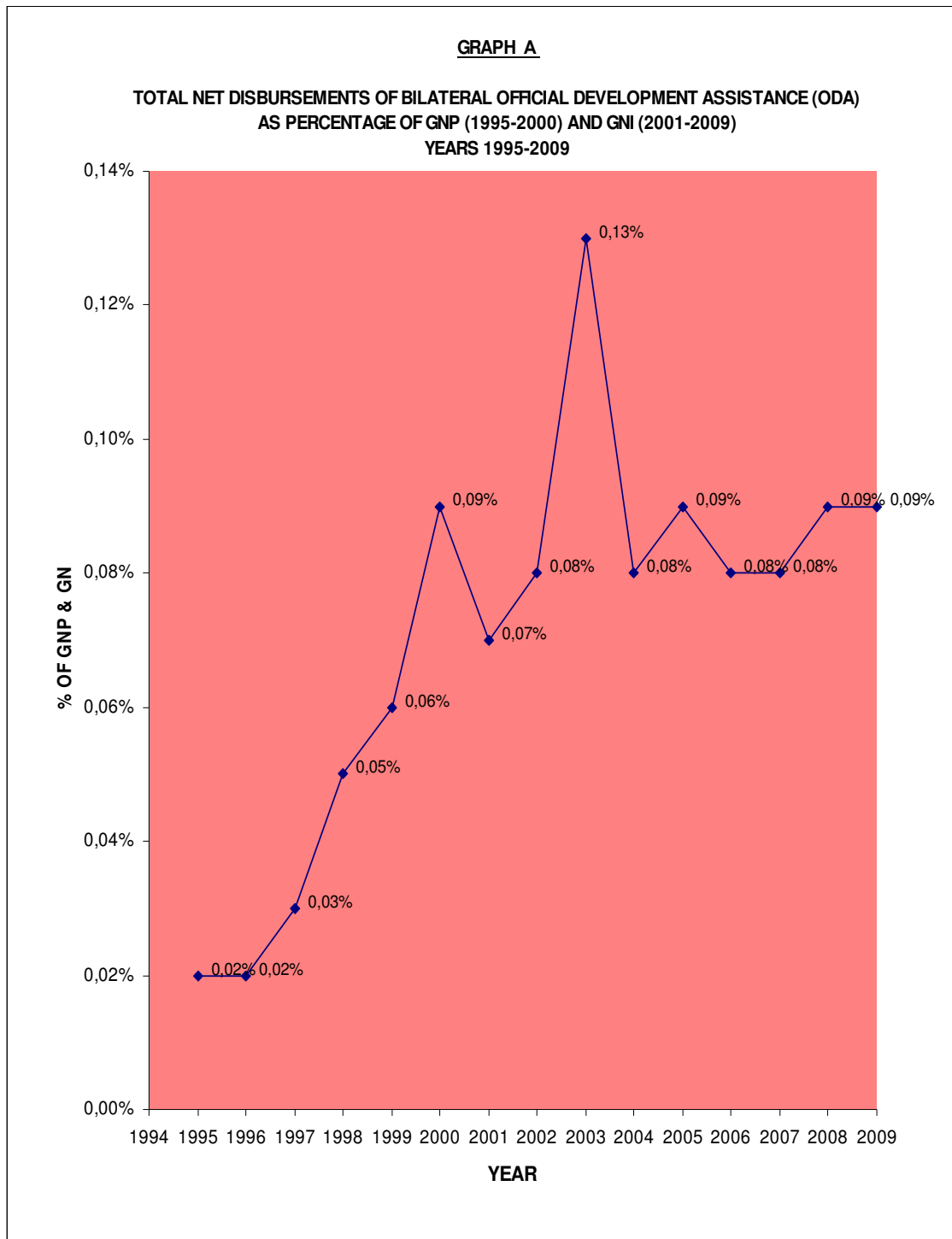

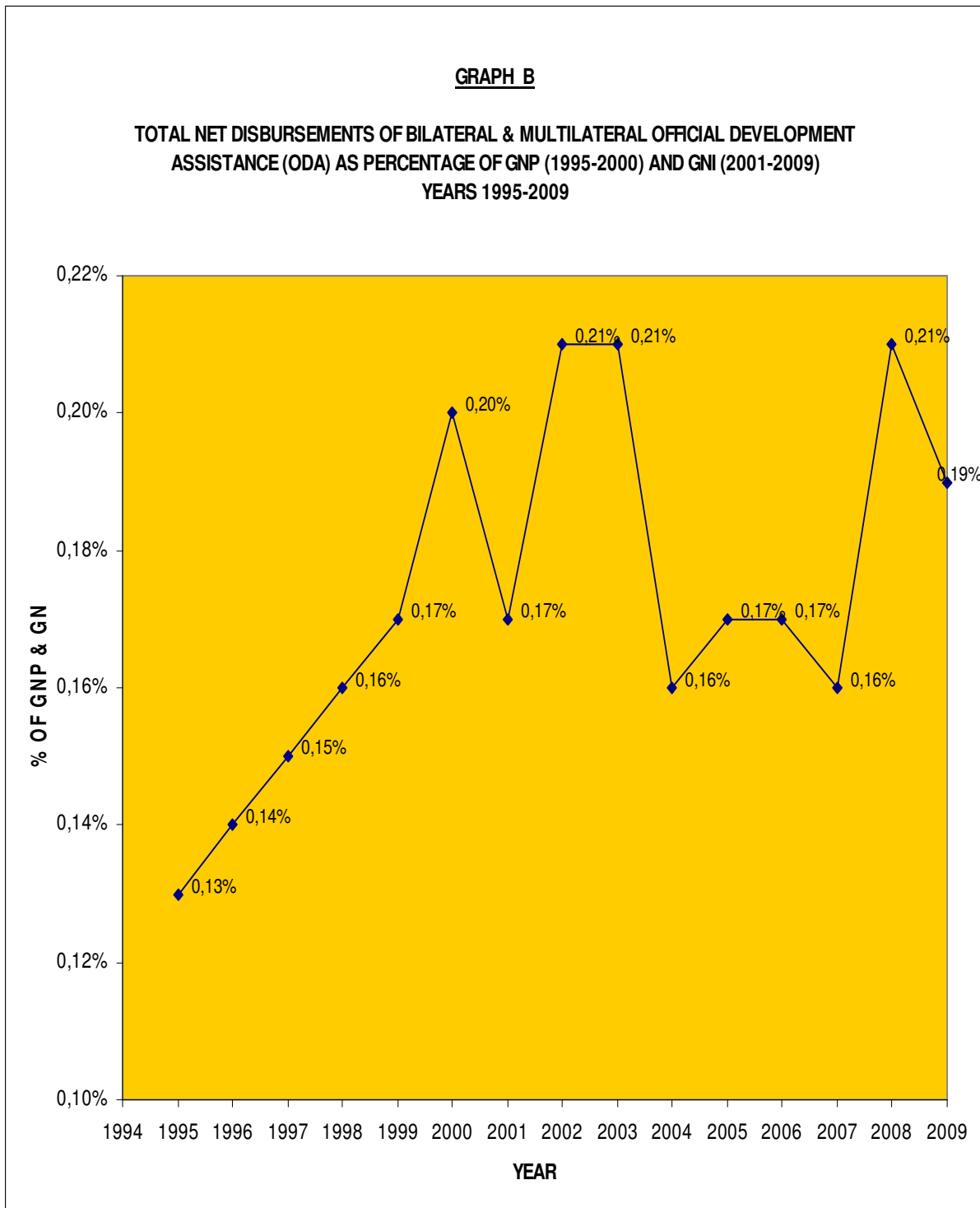
Percentage allocation of Bilateral Official Development Assistance (ODA) by Sector of Aid [Year 2009]

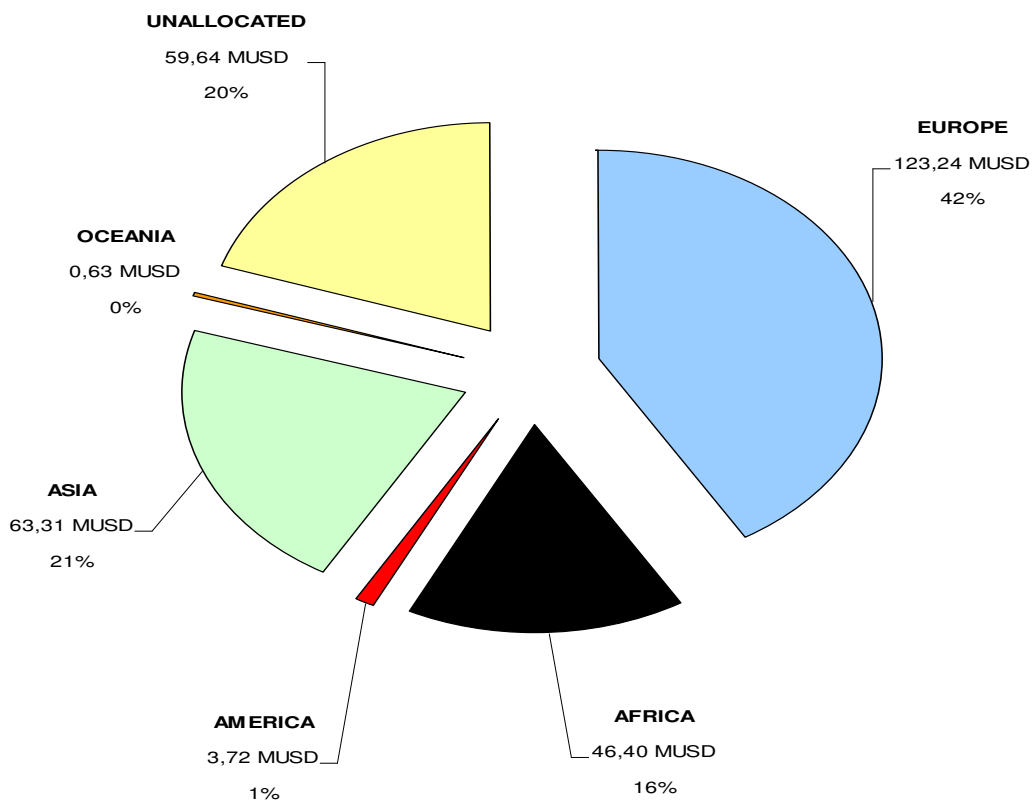

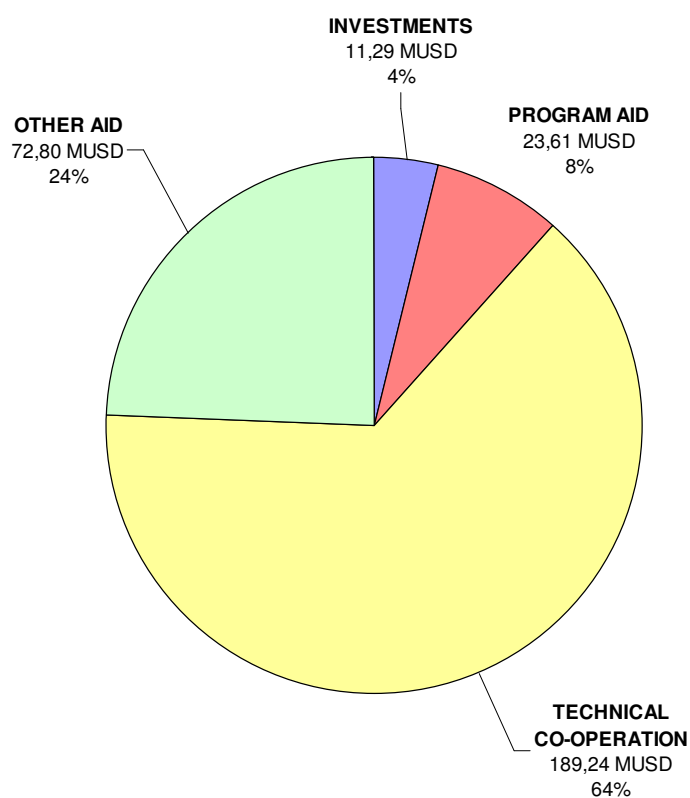

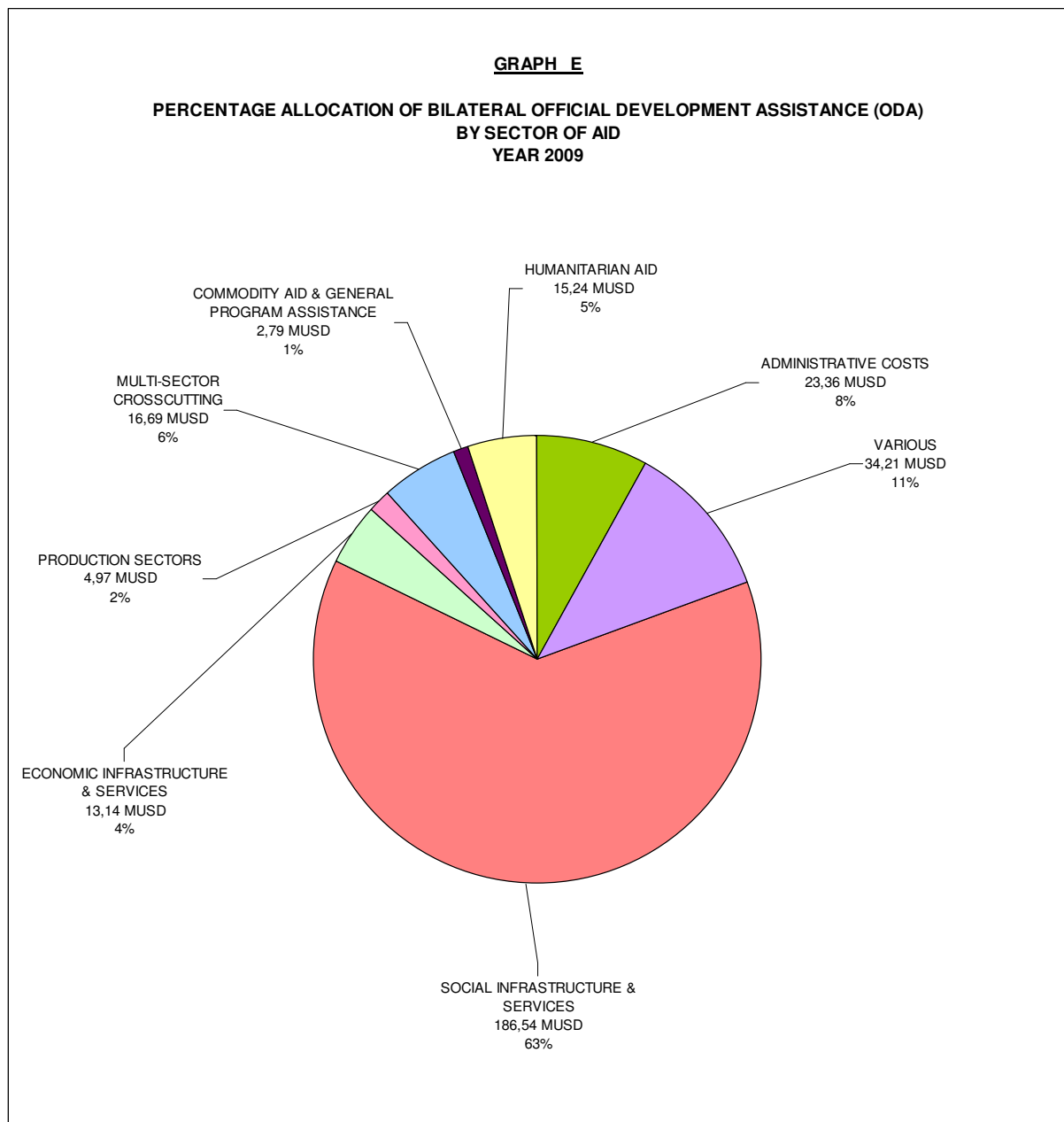

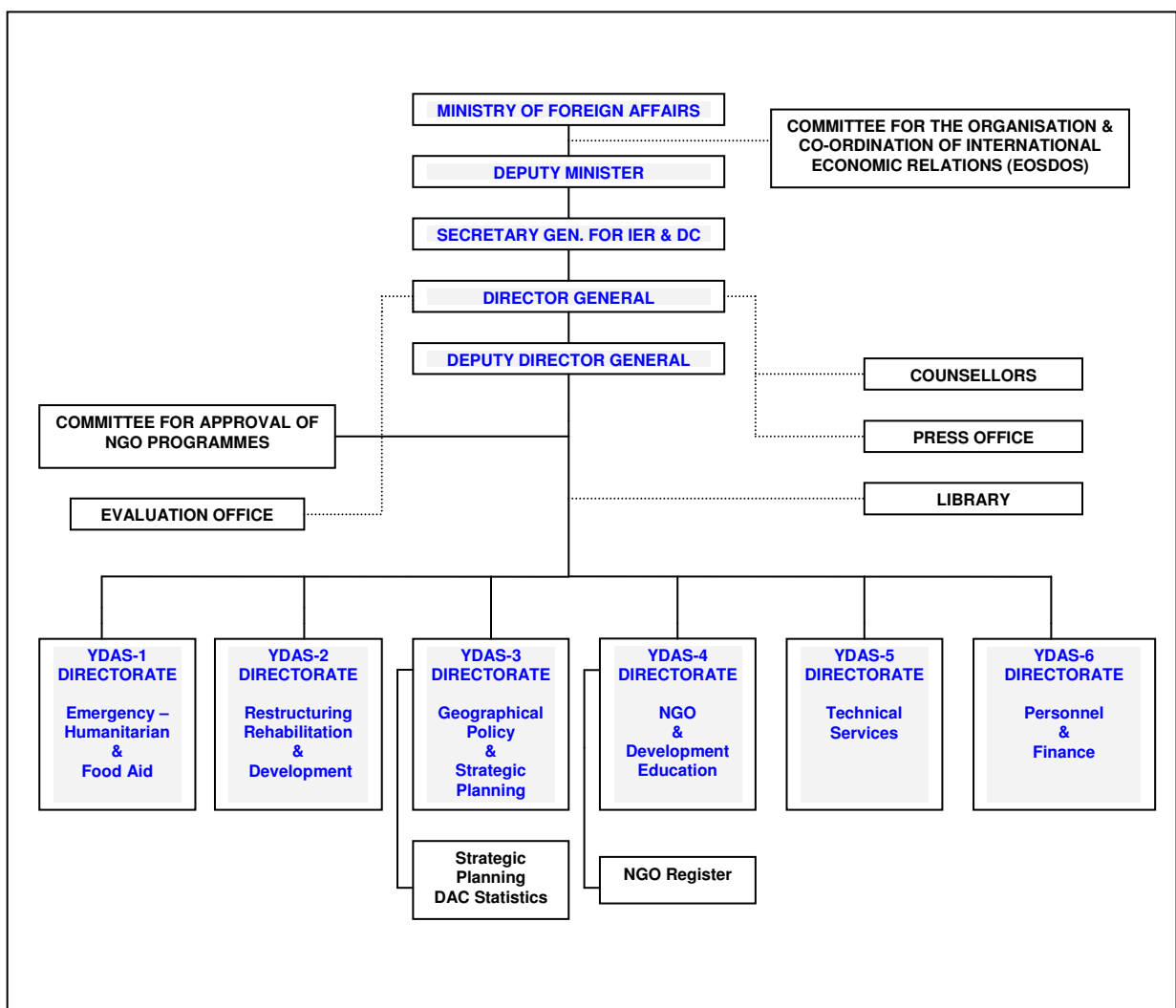

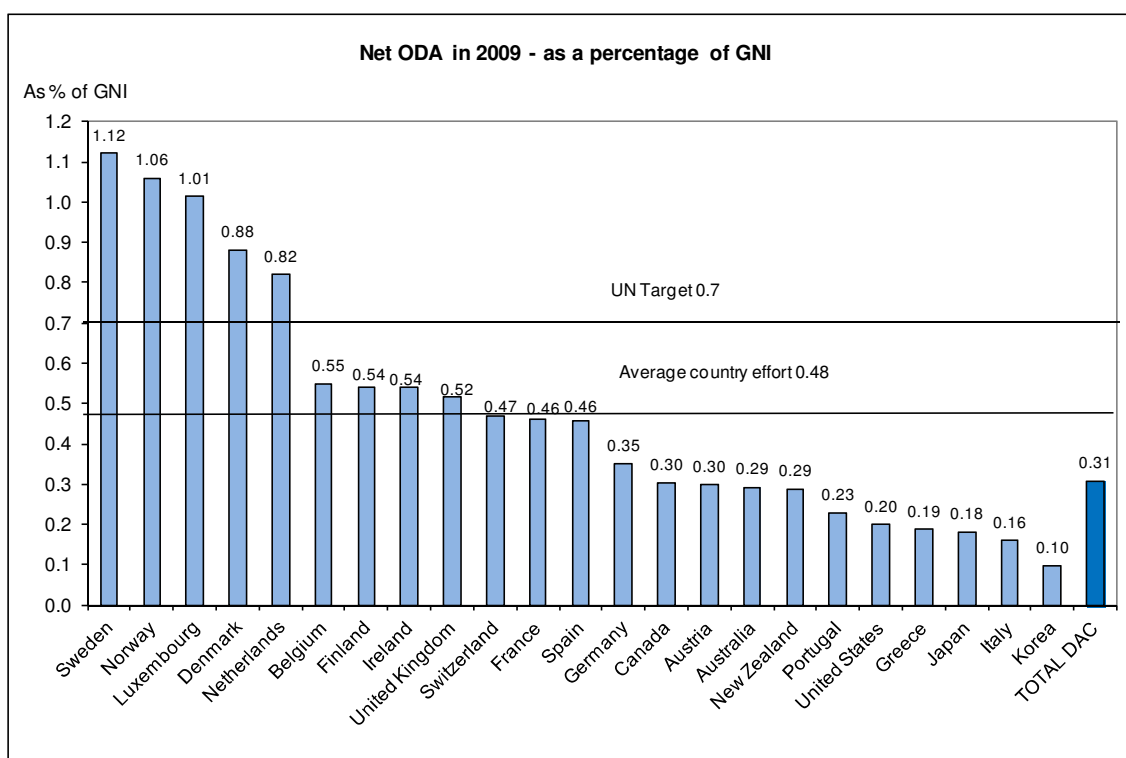
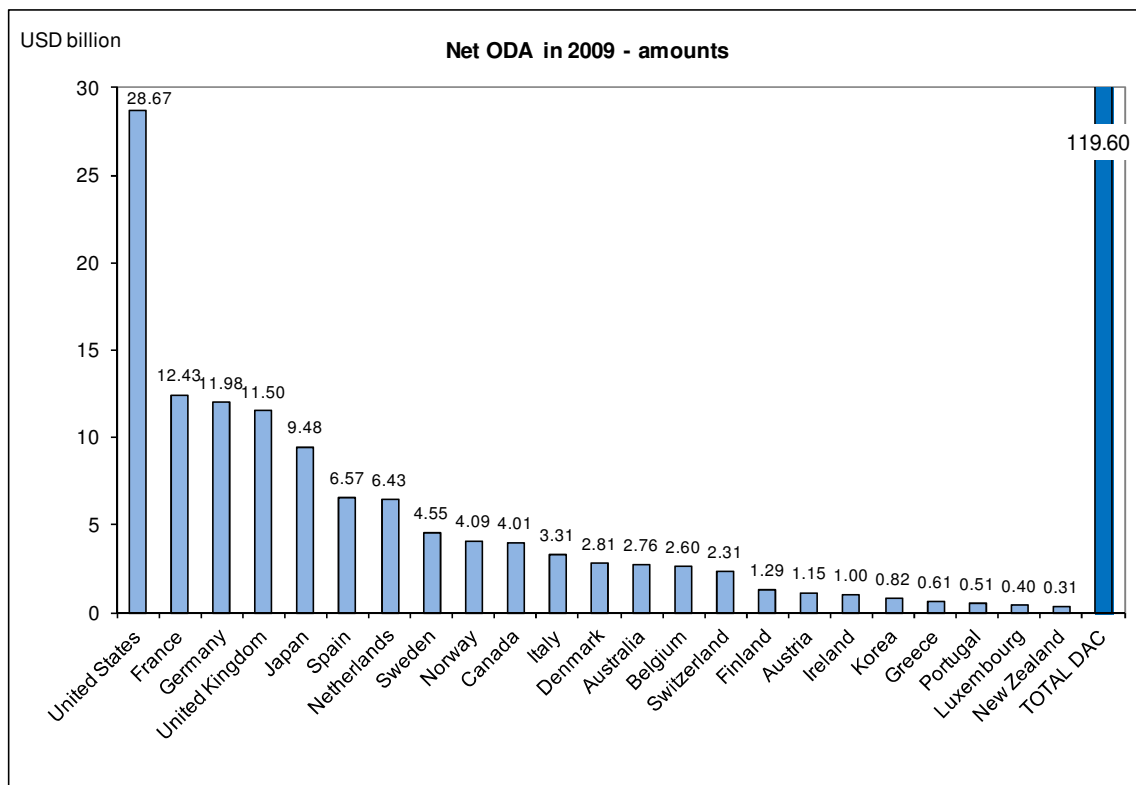
